
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The Demands of Modern School Libraries




With ebooks, students can read on any device, personalise display settings and keep reading even when they are away from school. A flexible reading experience helps every student feel comfortable and in control.



Audiobooks: Literacy Through Immersive Voices

Audiobooks open the door for students who might struggle with print alone. They support listening skills, improve comprehension and help EAL learners, reluctant readers and busy families engage with stories in a way that fits their day.


For many students, having the choice to listen as well as read keeps them motivated and confident. Students have the freedom to listen however it suits them, while travelling, relaxing at home or during quiet study time.



Decodable Readers: Structured Phonics for Early Literacy

Phonics-based decodable readers are an essential tool for building reading fluency and confidence in young learners. A good digital library includes structured decodables that match how students learn to decode and blend sounds step by step.


With digital access, teachers can assign books by level, students can practise at home, and families can follow progress without needing extra copies in backpacks.



Supporting Students Beyond the Curriculum

A good library does more than build literacy; it should support student wellbeing too. Many school libraries include books that explore mental health, resilience, belonging and identity to help students feel seen and supported.

Digital access makes it easier for students to find safe, ageappropriate titles they can read privately, anytime and anywhere. For reluctant readers or those with anxiety around reading, tools like audiobooks build confidence and keep them connected to books in a way that feels comfortable.



Shared Collection Consortiums

A shared collection works like a reading club for schools. Instead of each school buying every digital book outright, schools join together to share access to a much larger library than they could afford alone.





Strong privacy and data protection standards help schools meet GDPR policies and reassure families that student information is safe and handled responsibly.





07 Budgeting for a Digital Library

Making the Most of Limited Budgets

A digital library can be one of the smartest investments a school makes, but like any big change, it needs thoughtful budgeting and planning.

When preparing your budget, consider whether a shared collection, private titles or a mix best fits your needs. Talk with your leadership team early to align the digital library with curriculum goals and student outcomes. Use clear usage data and student impact reports to demonstrate value and secure ongoing funding year after year.

Don't forget to explore grants, literacy initiatives or regional funding that may help cover startup or subscription costs. With good planning, your digital library stays affordable, up to date and ready to grow with your students.

A well-planned launch ensures your digital library isn't just switched on, it's actively used by staff and students from day one. This checklist provides your school with a practical roadmap for setting up, promoting, and embedding your digital library into every classroom.

| | Nominate a primary contact. A (like a librarian or literacy lead) should act as the go-to for staff and students. |
| | Connect your school systems. Check that your digital library is integrated with your SSO & LMS for simple access. |
| | Customise & Brand. Add your school logo and colours so students recognise it as their digital library. |
| | Prepare communications . Draft an all-staff email, a letter to parents, and short student announcement. |
| | Test Your Setup . Log in as a student and staff member to check that browsing, borrowing, and device compatibility are working correctly before launch to fix any issues early. |

| | Train your school staff. Show teachers how to browse books, assign them, create classes and check student usage reports. |
| | Student introductions. Visit classes or run an assembly to show students how to log in, browse and borrow books. |
| | Create custom compilations. Set up curated digital shelves by year group, new arrivals or seasonal picks (e.g. book week). |
| Tip | s For Ongoing Promotion of Your Digital Library |
| | Upskill staff. Offer mini refreshers, tips on using new features or links to how-to videos for new staff. |
| | Use promotional resources. Use posters, bookmarks, and socia media graphics to promote the eLibrary around the school. |
| | Highlight usage. Share borrowing usage insights in staff meetings and celebrate those who've used it most. |
| | Run a reading challenge. Organise simple challenges like Book Bingo or Top Reader of the Month and celebrate the winners! |
| | Gather feedback. Ask teachers and students for feedback. What's working? What do students love? |
| | Plan ahead. Each term, review curriculum links to check new titles that could support upcoming topics or events. |

Frequently Asked Questions

How soon can a digital library be set up?

Your digital library can be live in under 48 hours, but we recommend having a clear launch plan in place to help ensure that students and staff get the most out of it from day one.

How do we know if students actually use it?

Your digital library provides clear usage reports that show which students are borrowing, what they're reading and how often. This helps school staff measure student reading engagement.

Are Curriculum texts (e.g. novel studies) included?

Shared Collections include popular curriculum novels and study texts for each region. Schools can also add private titles to cover specific syllabus requirements or teacher requests.

Can schools access multiple copies for simultaneous use?

Yes, with Class Sets, every student can access the same title simultaneously. Shared collections also include thousands of free titles from Project Gutenberg, offering unlimited simultaneous loans.

Who curates the Shared Collections?

Shared Collections combine real borrowing data from thousands of schools with input from member schools, so every title is chosen to be relevant and valuable for each region and year group.

Students can read or listen on any computer, tablet or smartphone. Most schools access the library via a web browser, with a free app also available for offline reading.
